Fun Facts About Lenten Traditions Around the World:

Danes’ traditional Last Hurrah before Lent is called “Fastelavn” and consists of the eating of multitudes of jam-filled pastries and children whacking a barrel full of candy. The kids who successfully break it open are declared “Cat King” and “Cat Queen.” In case you’re wondering, yes, that is because before candy, the barrel used to contain a live cat. Of course, these are the folks who brought us Lutefisk and Frances McDormand’s accent in *Fargo*. So I guess beating a barrel with a cat in it isn’t that weird.

In Oaxaca, Mexico, the final Friday of Lent is observed by people making aguas frescas and ice cream and giving them out to passersby, in honor of the Samaritan woman who gave Jesus water on his way back to Galilee.

In Germany, Holy Thursday is known as “Green Thursday” and green foods are eaten. Swedish children dress as witches on Holy Thursday and are given Easter Eggs and candy. Why witches? I have absolutely no idea.

Our **NEW** Youth Missionary Program

At the request of three (3) young students from our Parish, we would like to send them on a mission trip to Honduras to serve the poorest of the poor in the city of LaPaz Honduras.

Laura Hallfrisch, Jamie Rivard and Tyler Rivard are interested in doing missionary work for **two (2) weeks**. As a parish we would be sending these young people to join with other Catholic youth of our area. They are a part of the **Servants of Christ** who have been going for years.

They will be leaving at the beginning of the summer. They are hoping to raise funds for this trip through the generosity of our parish. Some of the things this missionary group from Upper Michigan **has established** and does each year is:

A Bible Fiesta - For 10+ years they have put on a Bible camp where approximately 325 children from ages of 5-10 come to pray and learn.

A medical clinic – The group hires Honduran doctors, dentists and nurses to perform the actual clinic and they are their support people.

A Skill Center – in the past 3 years they have added skill classes to their mission. These classes

are designed to teach the people of the barrio skills to help them support their families. Currently included in the skill center are sewing, crocheting and wood working classes.

Missionaries of Charity – they financially support and spend time with the children. These children are diagnosed with HIV and have no family to care for them. They also work with the elderly people at Missionaries of Charity.

This Missionary trip costs approximately **\$1300.00** per person. In addition to working on that cost, the youth have been purchasing supplies, such as **vitamins and supplements**, to take with them for the people of LaPaz who are in most need. They are also working to take as much clothing and small toy items for the children as they can buy and can fit in their luggage. The children of the *barrio* have so little!

Any donation to help them make this missionary trip a reality would be very much appreciated. It is my goal that any extra will go into a fund to make it easier for anyone from our Parish that may feel called to do the same. A SMALL CROSS - A POWERFUL MESSAGE

When driving to, from, and through Frankenmuth, Michigan, I'm always intrigued with the many small simple crosses in the front yards of the homes we pass by.

Those crosses are a statement of support for Frankenmuth's Christian foundation.

Two years ago an atheist living there complained about two crosses on a bridge in town. He requested that they be removed and the town removed them.

He then decided that, since he was so successful with that, the city shield should also be changed since it had on it, along with other symbols, a heart with a cross inside signifying the city's Lutheran beginnings.

At that point, the residents decided they had had enough. Hundreds of residents made their opinions known by placing small crosses in their front yards.

Seeing this quiet but powerful statement from the community, the man removed his complaint. Those simple crosses remain in those front yards today.

After passing those crosses for two years, it finally hit me that a small cross in millions of front yards across our country could provide a powerful and inspiring message for all Americans passing them every day.

I think it might be time to take this idea across America. We have an administration that says "we are not a Christian nation" and everywhere you look the ACLU and others are trying to remove from our history and current lives any reference to God, prayer, or the fact that our country was founded on Judeo-Christian principles.

The majority of Americans are Christians, why are we letting this happen to us?
