CATECHETICAL CORNER

The Mass (Cont.)

The Sign of the Cross (Cont.): When we make the sign of the cross in the beginning of the Mass we do not focus on the Son alone. We call upon the name of the Father, Son, and the Holy Spirit. Jesus commanded his disciples to baptize everybody, 'In the Name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.' At every baptism the priest repeats the same formula. So when we make the sign of the cross hereafter, on any occasion, at the Mass or our private prayer, we need to keep these facts in our minds.

<u>Greeting:</u> After the sign of the cross the priest is not supposed to greet the people with 'good morning or good evening'; rather he greets the congregation in Biblical language of greeting. He normally says either, "The Lord be with you" or "the Grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of god, and the Communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all." Then people respond: "And with your spirit."

From the Biblical perspective, "The Lord be with you" is no ordinary greeting as some priests do in the beginning of the Mass 'good morning or good evening.' If we truly know the Scriptural background of these words, we might approach this greeting with more respect and trust. On a basic level, these words convey the reality of Jesus' presence with the community of believers assembled in his name, for the celebration of the Mass. Jesus said, *"When two or three are gathered in my name, there am I in their midst" (Mt 18:20).* This liturgical greeting also expresses the profound reality of God's life dwelling within our souls by virtue of our baptism. With these words the priest is praying that the divine life we received may continue to grow within us.

When we go through the Bible, we understand the depth and power of these greeting 'The Lord be with you'- especially in the lives of great Heroes who were called by God for special tasks. We see the assurance of God's presence with these Heroes when they were called. For instance, if we take the calls of Isaac, Jacob, Moses and Joshua, King David and all the Prophets, we see right in the beginning God assuring these men that **'He would be with them.'** These men, though initially were timid and unprepared for the mission, the assurance of God's presence with them gave them the power. In all these cases when God called them, either He or His angels addresses the person with the assurance that "The Lord is with you." Just take the example of Joshua; after Moses died, God called Joshua to the daunting task of leading the people into the Promised Land, through the powerful enemies. God said to Joshua, **"No man shall be able to stand before you all the days of your life; as I was with Moses, so I will be with you."** When the angel Gabriel appeared to Mary, the first thing he did to her was the assurance of God's presence with her. **The angel said to Mary, "Hail, favored on! The Lord is with you" (Luke 1: 28).**

On the one hand, from the Scriptural perspective, the words, "*The Lord be with you*" reminds us of the high calling we have. As God's children, each one of us has a particular mission to fulfill in the Father's Plan. When we hear these words, we should realize that we are standing in the footsteps of the past Heroes and the same Lord is with us for completing our mission too. On the other hand, these words also assure us that we have access to a higher power that can support us through the trials and challenges of life and help us be faithful in whatever task God has entrusted to us. If we feel uncertain or inadequate in our tasks, we should remember that 'The Lord is with us.'

The second option of the greeting, "*The Grace of our Lord Jesus Christ and the love of God and the Communion of the Holy Spirit, be with you all*" comes from the Epistles of Paul to different churches (see Rom. 1:7; 1Cor. 1:3; Gal. 1:3; Eph. 1:2) which gives the same assurance of God's presence with us. These words in particular underscore the fact that our faith comes to us from the apostles, to whom Christ entrusted his mission and authority, and who later passed that authority on to their successors. When we hear the salutation, 'Grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and Love of God the Father, and the Communion of the Holy Spirit," we become aware of our fellowship with the saints throughout the Church's history who have been greeted with these words ever since the time of St. Paul.
