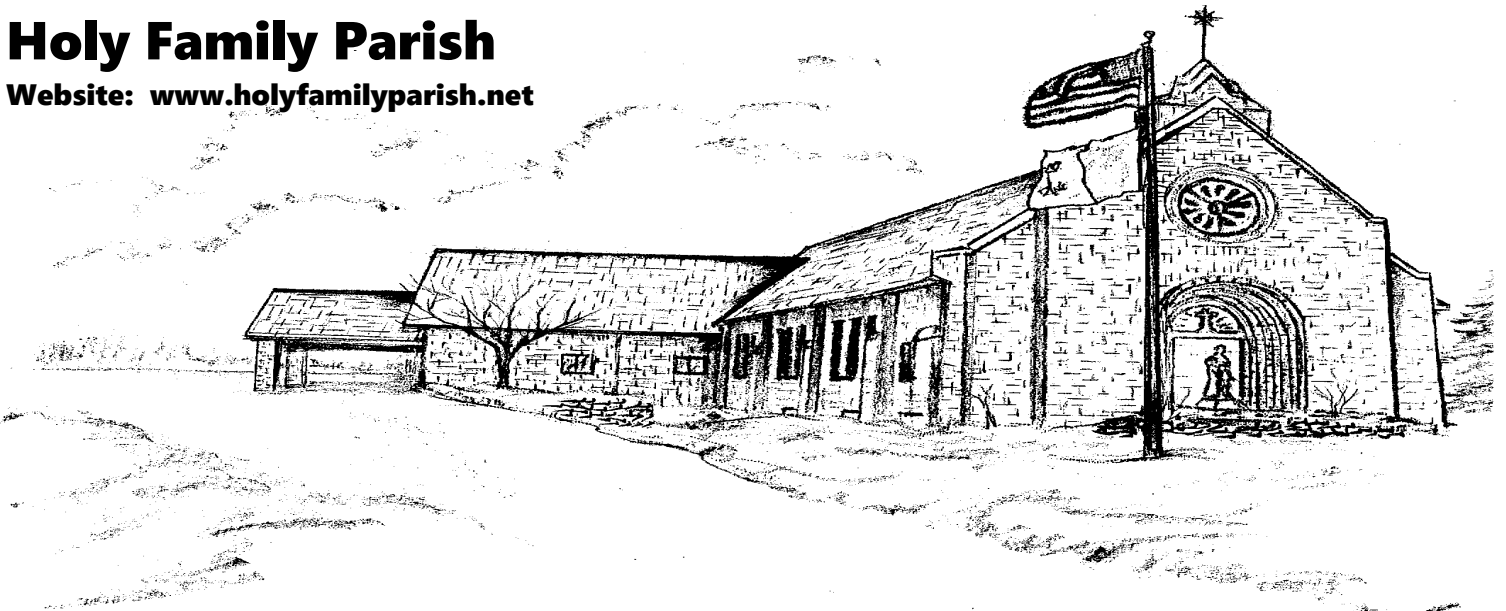

THE BIBLE STUDY

The Gospel of Luke

The Parable of the Rich man and Lazarus (Luke 16:19-31)

This is a parable constructed with such masterly skill that not one phrase is wasted. Let us look at the two characters in it.

(i) First, there is the rich man, usually called *Dives*, which is the Latin for rich. Every phrase adds something to the luxury in which he lived. He was clothed in purple and fine linen. That is the description of the robes of the High Priests, and such robes cost an immense sum in days when a working man's wage was one denarius a day. He feasted in luxury every day. The word used for feasting is the word that is used for a gourmet feeding on exotic and costly dishes. He did this every day.

In a country where the common people were fortunate if they ate meat once in the week and where they toiled for six days of the week, Dives is a figure of indolent self-indulgence. Lazarus was waiting for the crumbs that fell from the rich man's table. In that time there were no knives, forks or napkins. Food was eaten with the hands and, in very wealthy houses the hands were cleansed by wiping them on hunks of bread, which were then thrown away. That was what Lazarus was waiting for.

(ii) Second, there is Lazarus. Strangely enough Lazarus is the only character in any of the parables who is given a name. The name is the Latinized form of *Eleazar* and means **God is my help**. He was a beggar; he was covered with *ulcerated* sores,

and so helpless that he could not even ward off the street dogs, which pestered him.

Such is the scene in this world; then abruptly it changes to the next and there Lazarus is in glory and Dives is in torment. What was the sin of Dives? He had not ordered Lazarus to be removed from his gate. He had made no objections to his receiving the bread that was flung away from his table. He did not kick him in the passing. He was not deliberately cruel to him. **The sin of Dives was that he never noticed Lazarus, that he accepted him as part of the landscape and simply thought it perfectly natural and inevitable that Lazarus should lie in pain and hunger while he wallowed in luxury.** As someone said, *"It was not what Dives did that got him into hell; it was what he did not do that got him into hell."*

The sin of Dives was that he could look on the world's suffering and need and feel no answering sword of grief and pity pierce his heart; he looked at a fellow-man, hungry and in pain, and did nothing about it. His was the punishment of the man who never noticed. **If wanted, the rich man could have changed the life of Lazarus for good. He had enough means for that. So his sin is not the sin of commission but that of omission.** The sin of omission is as serious as the sin of commission. There are a lot of people in the world who don't do any harm to their suffering brethren; but at the same time, though they can, don't do anything to help them.

LENTEN JOURNEY

By the Grace of God we are just beginning another Lenten Journey which gives us the ample opportunity to examine our lives and make changes in the areas where we need to change. Lent is the period of self evaluation of our life. It invites us for a new life.

This year also we have the Lenten devotions as usual. But it is left to each one of us how we will make use of them for our spiritual benefits. I don't encourage you to make big resolutions, which sound good, but unable to fulfill. So let us go with simple ones.

Stations of the Cross every TUESDAY AT 5.30 pm and followed by that we have the soup and sandwich supper. As we have every year this year again we will be listening Dr. Edward Sri for half hour on Knowing MARY through the BIBLE. We are familiar with Sri's appealing presentations.

I also encourage you to attend at least one extra Mass on weekdays, besides the Sunday Celebration. Also Lent is the good opportunity to do a little Corporal Acts of Mercy. It doesn't mean, it should be always with money.

LENTEN REMINDERS

Our Lenten Season begins this Wednesday, Feb. 18th. Our Ash Wednesday Masses are at 8:00 AM & 6:00 PM. The following is just a littler reminder for all of us:

1. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday remain days of fast and abstinence. Abstinence is also to be observed on the Fridays of Lent.
2. Fasting is required of all the faithful in good health from the age of 18 to the beginning of their 60th year. Abstinence binds everyone over the age of 14.
3. Fasting usually is interpreted to mean one full meal and, if necessary, two other small meals. One should not eat between meals, but milk, fruit juices, and other liquids are permitted.
4. Abstinence means no meat should be eaten during the entire day.
5. Anyone unable to observe the fast or abstinence obligations because of health or other serious reasons, should substitute another penance.
