CATECHETICAL CORNER

Penitential Rite (Cont.)

<u>I Confess (Confiteor) Cont.</u> Last week we started with the Confiteor and found the Biblical references to it. This week we continue with it and will go through each phrase.

Since confessing sin was a common practice in ancient Israel and in the New Testament period, it is not at all surprising that the early Christians confessed their sins before partaking in the Eucharistic Celebration (Breaking of the Bread). In the Confiteor not only we confess our sins to God, but also to you *'my brothers and sisters*. 'The prayer thus follows the exhortation of Apostle James, 'confess your sins to one another.' It also highlights the social impact of sin. Our sins affect our relationship with God and our relationship with each other. The Confiteor also challenges us to consider seriously four areas in which we may have fallen into sin: "In my thoughts and in my words, in what I have done and what I have failed to do." These four points serve as an excellent examination of conscience. Let us see these four areas in details.

- a. <u>In my thoughts:</u> St. Paul exhorts us to guard our thoughts, keeping them focused on what is good: *"Whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely whatever is gracious, if there is any excellence, if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things" (Phil 4:8). Jesus warns in the Sermon on the Mount more than once about ways we can fall into sin in our thoughts. For example, without even physically harming someone, we can sin through our anger toward others (Mt 5:22). Without ever physically touching someone, we can fall into adultery of the heart through our lustful thoughts (Mt 5:27-28).*
- b. <u>In my words:</u> the letter of James warns us that the tongue is a fire. The spoken word can be used to bless and to curse, and when it is used for evil, it causes great turmoil. "How great a forest is set ablaze by a small fire"- and the tongue has that power. The Bible mentions many ways our speech can be used to harm someone. For example, gossip (1Cor 12:20; 1Timothy 5:13; Rom 1:29), slander (Rom1:30; 1 Timothy 3:11), insult (Mt 5:22), lying (Col 3:9; Wisdom 1:11; Sirach 7:12-13). Those above sins come under our thoughts.
- c. <u>In what I have done:</u> This area encompasses what most people commonly think about sin- actions that directly hurt other people or our relationship with God. Along these lines, the Ten Commandments are often used as the basis for an examination of conscience. These are the **sins of commission-means that which are committed.**
- **d.** <u>In what I have failed to do:</u> This is the most challenging part. Not only are we responsible for the selfish, prideful, and evil actions we have committed, but we also will be held accountable on the Day of Judgment for the good that we failed to do. Apostle James teaches, "Whoever knows what is right to do and fails to do it, for him it is sin" (James 4:17). These are the sins of omission- means the good act which we intentionally omitted to do. The part of the Confiteor reminds us that Christian path is not merely just of avoiding sinful thoughts, words, desires, and actions. Christianity is ultimately about the imitation of Christ. We must put on Christ and his virtues. It is not enough that we should avoid committing sin but we should do something good.
