CATECHETICAL CORNER

Commandments

Second Commandment (Cont): The Second Commandment calls us to the virtue of reverence for God, which trains us to know and to preserve the difference between the Creator and the creature. Respect for God's name keeps us from reducing Him to a mere fact, or even a thing that we can control or manipulate. At the same time, a gracious God desires to be intimate with us, even becoming Incarnate in Jesus Christ and dwelling in us through the Holy Spirit. The name of God deserves the highest honor and respect. God does not prohibit us from using his name for good purpose. But we should not use his holy name for mean things like swearing and cursing. In our prayer, in our supplications we are allowed to call upon him by name. Even when Jesus prayed the "Our Father" he prayed "Hallowed be thy name." we also praise God's Holy Name in every mass at the beginning of the Eucharistic Prayer when we recite or sing the Holy, Holy, Holy.

The Second Commandment forbids the wrong use or misuse of God's name through blasphemy, curse and swearing. We should not bring God to a perjury and false oath. At the same time, God's name is vital for our faith and life. Scripture highlights numerous ways in which God's name is used in sufferings as well as in good times. When Job was in the midst of his worst suffering, he said., "The Lord gave and the Lord has taken away; blessed be the name of the Lord" (Job 1: 21). When the psalmist wanted to express exultant praise of God and thanksgiving for favors received, the Holy Name was invoked, "Bless the Lord, my soul; all being, bless his Holy Name" (Ps 103:1). When the Blessed Virgin Mary praised God for calling her to be the Mother of the Son of his Son, she chanted, "Holy is his Name (Lk 1:49).

<u>The Third Commandment:</u> "Remember the Sabbath Day, to keep it holy. Six days you shall labor, and do all your work; but the seventh day is a Sabbath to the Lord your God; in it you shall not do any work" (Ex 20:8-10).

The third Commandment of the Decalogue recalls the holiness of the Sabbath. In speaking of the Sabbath Scripture recalls creation: "For in six days the Lord made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, and rested the seventh day; therefore the lord blessed the Sabbath day and hallowed" (Ex 20: 11). God's action is the model for human action. If God rested and refreshed on the seventh day, man too ought to rest and should let others, especially the poor, be refreshed. The Sabbath brings everyday work to a halt and provides a respite.

The Gospel reports a few incidents when Jesus was accused of violating the Sabbath Law. But Jesus never fails to respect the holiness of this day. He gives this law its authentic and authoritative interpretation: "The Sabbath was made for man, not man for the Sabbath." With compassion, Christ declares the Sabbath for doing good rather than harm, for saving life rather than killing. The Sabbath is the day of the Lord of mercies and a day to honor God. The Jews celebrated the Sabbath on the seventh day, for the reason that God Himself rested on the seventh day after six days of creation.

Lord's Day: The early Christians who were Jewish converts followed strictly all the Mosaic Laws, including the observance of Sabbath. But on the first day of the week, Sunday, they again gathered together to celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. Eventually, the Christians were evicted from the Synagogues and as a result they confined themselves only to the celebration the Lord's Day. This was the only day they came together and also participated in the Breaking of the Bread, the Eucharist. The practice of the observance of the Lord's Day which started in the very first century continues even this very day. The Church teaches that on Sunday the faithful should assemble to participate in the Eucharist and hear the Word of God. Sunday is to be a day of gladness and rest from work. The duty to participate in the Mass is a grave obligation. The celebration of the Lord's Day and his Eucharist is at the heart of the Church's life. Sunday is the day on which the paschal mystery is celebrated in the light of the apostolic tradition and is to be as the foremost Holy Day of obligation.
