CATECHETICAL CORNER

The Mass

Liturgy of the Word; The Gospel Reading:

While the entire Bible is inspired, Vatican II teaches that the Gospels rightly have a special place because they are our principal source for the life and teaching of the Incarnate Word, our Savior. At the Alleluia singing the people stand reverently to listen to the Gospel which is proclaimed by a deacon or if there is no deacon, by priest himself. No lay person is allowed to proclaim the Gospel during the Liturgical Celebration. People stand showing the gesture of reverence in welcoming Jesus who is about to be proclaimed in the Gospel reading. The lector or the deacon takes the Gospel at the entrance procession and then places it on the altar. During the Alleluia singing, if the deacon proclaims the Gospel he bows before the priest and asks for his blessing. In response to it the priest says in low voice, *"The Lord be in your heart and on your lips that you may worthily proclaim the Gospel."* If the priest is the one who proclaims the Gospel, he bows before the Altar and prays in low voice, *"Almighty God, cleanse my heart and my lips that I may worthily proclaim your Gospel."* Then he begins to process with the Gospel is proclaimed. The priest or deacon begins with the invocation" The Lord be with you," at which the people respond, "And with your spirit." Then the priest or deacon announces – 'the Gospel and people respond 'Glory to you, Lord. At the end of the proclamation the priest or deacon announces – 'the Gospel of the Lord and the people respond – 'Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.'

The Homily: It has been the practice in the Church from the very beginning of the time that at the Sunday Eucharistic celebration the Word of God was not read on its own. It was always accompanied by the explanation of it by an ordained minister and a practical application was drawn out of it. The same practice continues in the Church today. In the early Church only the Bishops celebrated the Sunday Mass and the homily was delivered by them. But today the priests share that authority to deliver a homily after the Word of God, no matter it is at Sunday Mass or even weekday Mass. Sometimes the Catholics **confuse homily with sermon.** In the Protestant churches the term homily is not used, rather only sermon. The homily is the strict interpretation of the readings of the day whereas sermon is the speech delivered on any particular theological or Biblical topics. On Sundays the priests are not supposed deliver a sermon rather a homily, unless some special needs arise. The homily is crucial for the instruction of the faithful so that they can understand the readings and apply them to their lives. Perhaps, for many a Sunday Mass is the only opportunity they have to get the Word of God explained. So no priest is supposed to neglect this duty. Only a priest or deacon is allowed to deliver the homily at Sunday Mass. There may be people in the congregation who may be well versed in Scripture; but they have other opportunities in the Church to share their abilities.

THE CREED: After the homily, on Sundays and Holy Days of obligation we make a solemn profession of our faith by reciting the Nicene Creed. It is a summary of faith expressed by the Council of Nicaea (325 AD) and repeated by the Council of Constantinople (381 AD). It has been an essential element of the Sunday Liturgy since the sixth century. The purpose of this Profession of Faith is to give the gathered people an opportunity to respond to the Word of God that was proclaimed in the readings. It also calls to mind the great mysteries of our faith that we celebrate in the Liturgy of the Eucharist. The New Translation of the Nicene Creed contains a few new words that will once again challenge us, so it will take a little time to get used to before it becomes familiar to our minds. One of those words is *"Consubstantial"* which professes that Jesus and the Father are of one substance, One God. Another word that will challenge us in the Creed is *"Incarnate;"* this too reveals that Jesus, the Son of God was given a human body through the motherhood of the Blessed Virgin Mary. You will also notice when we begin the Creed we will be using the singular pronoun, *"I believe"* instead of *"we believe."* This change is calling us to make a personal profession of our faith.
