CATECHETICAL CORNER

The Commandments

The Fifth Commandment: Suicide (Cont.): It has been a constant worry for the good Christians as what would be the fate of their dear one who took his/her life? All practicing Christians know that suicide is a mortal sin and anyone who dies in mortal sin without repentance is liable to eternal punishment. Then to what extent suicide becomes a mortal sin? The Church is very careful in judging a person who has committed a mortal sin apparently. In other words, though one act looks to be a grave one, doesn't mean that the person who did that really committed a mortal sin in that particular situation. In order to know whether apparently a grave sin has become a mortal sin we should know the three conditions which make a sin mortal or venial.

- 1. The matter itself should be grave or it should be a serious violation of any Commandment of God. For instance a willful murder of somebody or oneself is a mortal sin in matter or suicide is a grave sin.
- **2. Full knowledge of the matter:** A grave matter itself can become mortal only when the person who commits it has a full knowledge that it is indeed a grave sin. For instance all good Christians are supposed to know that suicide is a grave sin.
- 3. Full consent or freedom of choice or reasoning: These factors should be checked in the case of a person who commits suicide. First of all a person who commits suicide doesn't do that for fun or enjoyment. For everybody his/her life is very dear and people will do their best to enjoy it for long. A person reaches to the point of suicide only due to the utmost mental pressure or stress due to various reasons. When a person is in uncontrollable stress he/she loses the freedom of choice or the right reasoning. So there isn't a willful consent here. For time being his/her the mind becomes totally blank. If the person can pass that stressful moment by any means, he/she would change the mind. So we should not bluntly judge a person who happened to commit suicide condemn him/her eternal punishment.

Euthanasia: It is willfully killing the physically ill person so that he/she may not become a liability to the family or Society. The Church teaches that the life should be respected and protected from the very moment of the conception till the natural death. We live in a throwaway society and there is a tendency to get rid of people who are no more useful for the material need of the society. Some of the European countries have already passed the bill allowing euthanasia. Even the doctors in those countries can decide whether one should continue to live or not. In other words, the patients' consent is not sought. Some of my priest friends working in the European countries tell me that the people in the nursing homes are afraid to go to a hospital for treatment for being afraid of euthanasia. The Catholic Church strongly condemns such brutal act against humanity. At the same time the family members of a patient are not obliged to take extraordinary means to keep one alive. But at the same time affordable means should not be denied. (We will continue next week).
