CATECHETICAL CORNER

The Mass

Presentation of Gifts (Cont.): After offering the bread and wine the priest washes his hands in gesture that signals a dramatic event is about to take place. I remember, in my younger age some good Christians explained this as reenacting the act of Pilate who washed his hands before he condemned Jesus to death. Perhaps they believed so, for the very reason that the Mass is the re-enactment of the Sacrifice of Jesus on Calvary. But this has nothing to do with Pilate's washing of hands. This practice actually recalls the rites for the priests of the Old Testament. Before entering the sanctuary to offer sacrifice, the priests and Levites had to undergo ritual of washings before they could perform their duties in the sanctuary (Ex.29:4). The priests needed to wash their hands and feet before entering the sanctuary or drawing near to the altar for incense. Keeping in mind this Biblical background, the washing of hands in the Mass indicates that he, like the Levitical priests of the Old, the priest at Mass is about to stand in a most holy place. This is the place where God is about to come down to His people. Finally, keeping in mind, his unworthiness, the priest begs for the prayers of the congregation before he begins the Eucharistic Prayer. In the new translation the use of two phrases to be noticed: 'my sacrifice' and 'yours' The use of my sacrifice points out to Christ's sacrifice which will be made present through the ordained minister who acts in the person of Christ.

<u>The Preface:</u> In the popular language Preface is an introduction to a book or other literary work written by the work's author. An introductory essay written by a different person is a *'foreword'* and precedes an author's preface. The preface often closes with acknowledgments of those who assisted in the literary work. In the liturgical use the term preface is applied to that **portion of the Eucharistic Prayer that immediately precedes the Canon or central portion of the Eucharist** (Mass or Divine Liturgy). **As you notice, it is a prayer of Thanksgiving prayed by the priest.**

After the presentation of the Gifts and the offertory prayer, the priest opens a three parts dialogue that has been recited in the Church since the third century.

Priest: The Lord be with you. People: And with your Spirit. Priest: Lift up your hearts. People: We lift them up to the Lord. Priest: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. People: It is right and just.

In the last liturgical exchange the priest says, "Let us give thanks to the Lord our God." As we have already seen in the Gloria and in the response to the Scripture readings, we hear the word 'thanks.' Thanksgiving is a common Biblical response to God's goodness and to his saving works in our lives. The priest directing us to give thanks to the Lord echoes the similar exhortation found in the Psalms: "Give thanks to the Lord for he is good" (Ps 136: 1-3). In the Jewish tradition thanksgiving is one thing we can actually offer to the Creator. There is a lot to be thankful for at this point of the Mass, especially we have to be thankful for the miracle about to take place in our midst, as the bread and wine on the altar will be changed into the Body and Blood of Christ.

After inviting to give thanks to the Lord, the priest now talks to God in a prayer of thanksgiving. The opening line is addressed to the Father and expresses what we have seen throughout Scripture: the duty of Lord's people to thank God. Normally the Preface prayer begins, "It is truly right and just our duty and salvation, always and everywhere to give your thanks, Father most holy..." But the priest does not say this prayer for himself. He offers it on behalf of the people who just expressed their desire to join the priest in thanksgiving to God when they said, "It is right and just" to give God thanks and praise. The preface prayer follows the pattern of thanksgiving in the Psalms in the Old Testament. Thanksgiving in general was offered for the gift of God's creation (Ps 136:4-9), for his provision in their lives (Ps 67:6-7), for his wondrous deeds (Ps 75:1) and for his saving acts (Ps 35:18).
