CATECHETICAL CORNER

The Precepts of the Church

We have just finished the study of the Ten Commandments in details, which were given to Moses by God. As Jesus was a Jew he strictly observed the Commandments and a few times he emphasized the importance of the Commandments. So the Church strictly follows these Commandments without any alteration. At the same time the Church has codified a lot of rules and regulations for the smooth running of the hierarchy and faith formation of the faithful. All these are written in one book called the **Code of Canon Law** of the Church. As members of the Catholic Church the faithful are supposed to observe these rules and regulations. Among these multiple rules and regulations the Church has formulated a set of regulations known as the **Precepts of the Church.** The Church emphasizes these Precepts as important as the Ten Commandments. So the faithful are strictly advised to observe them. In the following, let us see these Precepts in details.

<u>First Precept:</u> Attend Mass on all Sundays and Holy Day of Obligation. This Precept is founded on the Third Commandment-"You shall keep holy the Sabbath." The very law of nature demands that a man should devote a certain amount of time to the service of God. Now the Church tells us in details how we must observe this Precept. It is a mortal sin to neglect to attend Mass on Sundays and Obligatory days. To miss Mass is considered to be the transgression of the law in a grave matter and disobedience to the highest authority on earth. All Catholics who enjoy sound reasoning and who have already received the First Communion are obliged to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of obligation. There is no upper age limit- means so far one is physically able to come to Church are obliged.

The Church clearly explains as how to attend the Mass. To fulfill the obligation to attend Mass, four conditions are to be followed. **A) One must be bodily present at the Mass.** One cannot fulfill the obligation by just attending the Mass in a TV, unless special permission or exemption is granted by the local Bishop. And those who are physically unable to move are not obliged to attend the Mass and they can use the TV Mass as a substitute. Perhaps you remember, during the COVID the faithful were exempted from attending Mass for more than one year. (Unfortunately some Catholics still take this exemption granted and don't attend the Mass anymore.)

- B) One must attend the whole Mass. All 4 parts of the Mass such as the Penitential rite, Word of God, Eucharistic Prayer and Communion are equally important in the Mass. So unless there is sufficient reason, one should be there for the entire Mass. If one has missed the essential parts of the Mass such as the offertory, the Eucharistic Prayer and Communion rite, he/she has to attend another Mass to fulfill the obligation.
- C) One must attend Mass with full attention. It is not just enough to have our bodily presence at the Mass and then we wander with our minds. Of course, it is true that our minds are easily carried away by distractions, worries and concerns. In order to keep our attention focused we have the worship aids such as the prayers and hymns. If we make use of them, to great extent we can avoid the distractions.
- **D)** One must have proper intention. One must come to attend Mass with the right intention to worship God. Our intention to attend Mass should not be just prompted by the obligation attached to it.

It is enough that the Catholics may attend Mass in any Catholic Church or chapel. Attending a service in a Protestant Church on Sunday will never fulfill the Sunday Obligation at all. At the same time due to unavoidable circumstances if one misses the Mass will not be considered as a sin. For instance one is sick; one has to travel and on the way no convenient church is found; one has to take care of the sick at home or hospital; due to work schedule one can't make it- these are some exceptions. At the same time each person should genuinely examine the conscience and decide how serious and unavoidable the situation is. After all, God gives us 168 hours a week and we can use them the way want; but out of which one belongs to God and we have to give him that hour. But it is for our spiritual benefit and our presence will not add anything to God.
