The Gospel of Luke

Sermon on the Plain (Cont.): THE GOLDEN

RULE: Luke 6: 27-49)

Last week we heard Jesus asking his disciples "love your enemies and do good to those who hate you." And also we saw last week how this similar law was put negatively by other religious people. For instance, ." The Stoics had as one of their basic rules, "What you do not wish to be done to yourself, do not you do to any other."

Every one of these forms is negative. It is not unduly difficult to keep yourself from such action; but it is a very different thing to go out of your way to do to others what you would want them to do to you. The very essence of Christian conduct is that it consists, not in refraining from bad things, but in actively doing good things.

(ii) The Christian ethic is based on the extra thing. Jesus described the common ways of sensible conduct and then dismissed them with the question, "What special grace is in that?" So often people claim to be just as good as their neighbor's. Very likely they are. But the question of Jesus is, "How much better are you than the ordinary person?" It is not our neighbor with whom we must compare ourselves; we may well stand that comparison very adequately; it is God with whom we must compare ourselves; and in that comparison we are all in default.

(iii) What is the reason for this Christian conduct? The reason is that it makes us like God, for that is the way he acts. God sends his rain on the just and the unjust. He is kind to the man who brings him joy and equally kind to the man who grieves his heart. God's love embraces saint and sinner alike. It is that love we must copy; if we, too, seek even our enemy's highest good we will in truth be the children of God.

<u>Judge not</u> - See on Matthew 7:1; (note). "How great is the goodness of God, in being so willing to put our judgment into our own hands as to engage

himself not to enter into judgment with us, provided we do not usurp the right which belongs solely to him in reference to others!"

<u>**Condemn not</u>** - "Mercy will ever incline us not to condemn those unmerciful; whose faults are certain and visible; to lessen, conceal, and excuse them as much as we can without prejudice to truth and justice; and to be far from aggravating, divulging, or even desiring them to be punished."</u>

Forgive - The mercy and compassion which God recommends extend to the forgiving of all the injuries we have received, or can receive.

Luke 6:38, has the strange phrase, "People will give into your bosom." The Jew wore a long loose robe down to the feet, and round the waist a girdle. The robe could be pulled up so that the bosom of the robe above the girdle formed a kind of outsize pocket in which things could be carried. So the modern equivalent of the phrase would be, "People will fill your pocket."

(i) <u>Luke 6:39-40</u>: Jesus warned that no teacher can lead his scholars beyond the stage which he himself has reached. That is a double warning to us. In our learning we must seek only the best teacher for only he can lead us farthest on; in our teaching we must remember that we cannot teach what we do not know.

(ii) <u>Luke 6:41-42</u>: Here is an example of the humor of Jesus. It must have been with a smile that Jesus drew the picture of a man with a plank in his own eye trying to extract a speck of dust from someone else's eye. He taught that we have no right to criticize unless we ourselves are free of faults. That simply means that we have no right to criticize at all, because "there is so much bad in the best of us and so much good in the worst of us that it ill becomes any of us to find fault with the rest of us." Man can go wrong in judging as he sees only the appearance, not the innermost heart and intention of somebody. But only God can see the heart of a person.
