## **CATECHETICAL CORNER**

# The Precepts of the Church (Cont.)

### Attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Day of Obligation (Cont.): Holy Days of Obligation

The modern word 'holiday' is derived from 'holy day.' When the Western world was Catholic, during the centuries before it was disrupted by Protestant Revolution, holy days were feast days and they were observed like Sundays, by going to Mass and abstaining from work. In the past there were ten Holy Days of Obligation. But today they are reduced to five such as: January 1st Mary Mother of God; August 15th, The Assumption of our Lady; November 1st, All Saints Day; December 8th, Immaculate Conception and December 25th Christmas.

The Ascension of the Lord is also Holy Day of obligation which is observed on the 40th day of the Resurrection of the Lord which falls on Thursday. But many dioceses in our country moved this Feast to the 7th Sunday of Easter which is the Sunday after Thursday. Our Diocese also follows this rule. The Catholics are obliged to attend Mass on these Holy Days of obligation. The exemptions are granted on serious situations.

Servile Work: The Church commands all Catholics to keep Sunday holy by not only attending Mass but also abstaining from hard physical labor. In the modern materialistic world, the big corporate has taken away from the employees' their constitutional right to worship God on Sundays. So these days it is very common to see the shops and factories remain open. So the employees are forced to work on Sundays and Holy Day of Obligation. Naturally, these employees are exempted from the Sunday of Obligation, whenever they have to work on Sundays. But for the convenience of people the American churches keep the Saturday evening Mass which is equitant to Sunday Mass. If one is free from work on Saturday, he/she is supposed to make use of this opportunity. By servile work we mean in general that which requires more of the body than mind. The following are considered to be servile works; any work in factories or shops, plowing, sowing, harvesting, land mowing, masonry work, any work in one's own home workshop. But after attending Mass one is allowed to go for games, recreational activities, driving etc. But the unavoidable situations will give exemption from this rule.

### Second Precept: Keep the days of fasting and abstinence appointed by the Church.

This precept is important not only for the positive law it embodies but also for the principle it implies means, the necessity of mortification. Fasting and abstinence involve self-denial and penance. To some extent mortification is obligatory on all – in so far it is necessary to overcome mortal sin. The English Catechism tells us that the Church Commands to fast and abstain so that we may mortify the flesh and satisfy God for our sins.

There is difference between fasting and abstinence. Fasting on certain days of the year demands that one should eat only one full meal a day; it does not forbid us to take a light meal or some fruits as a substitute of the second meal. In the past there were more days of obligatory fasting observed in the Church. But today there are only two days of obligatory fasting, such as on **Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.** But the faithful are encouraged to fast more than these two days. Abstinence forbids one eating meat or meat products on prescribed days, such as on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. And also during the Lenten season every Friday is the day of abstinence. But during these days eggs and fish are allowed. All those who have attained the age of 14 and above are bound to abstain and fast. But those who are old and the sick are exempted from this rule.

### SACRAMENT OF ANOINTING OF THE SICK

Please remember, this Sacrament is a healing Sacrament and it should be administered on anyone who is seriously sick or dying or very old. Those who are getting ready for a serious surgery which involves anesthesia need to receive this Sacrament before the surgery. Please don't think that this is the Sacrament to receive only before the last breath goes from a person. Of course, there are unexpected situations on which one may not be able to find a priest on time. Don't worry about that time.
