THE BIBLE STUDY <u>The Gospel of Luke</u> God's Message to Mary

Luke 1: 26-38 (Kindly read the passage before you go through the exegesis).

According to Luke Mary was betrothed to Joseph. In Palestinian culture betrothal lasted for a year and was quite as binding as marriage. It could be dissolved only by divorce. Should the man to whom a girl was betrothed die, in the eyes of the law she was a widow. In the law there occurs the strange-sounding phrase, 'a virgin who is a widow.'

In this passage we are face to face with one of the great mysteries of the virgin birth/virgin conception. The **virgin birth of Jesus** is the belief that <u>Jesus</u> was conceived in the womb of his mother <u>Mary</u> through the <u>Holy</u> <u>Spirit</u> without the <u>agency of a human father</u> and born while Mary was yet a <u>virgin</u>. The New Testament references are <u>Matthew 1:18-25</u> and <u>Luke 1:26-38</u>. It is believed by Christians to follow the prophetic message in <u>Isaiah 7:14</u>. It is not expressly mentioned elsewhere in the Christian scriptures, and "the modern scholarly consensus is that the doctrine of the virgin birth rests on more Biblical foundation more than the historical foundation."

The virgin birth was universally accepted in the Christian church by the 2nd century and, except for some minor sects, was not seriously challenged until the 18th century. It is enshrined in the creeds that most Christians consider normative, such as the Nicene Creed ("incarnate of the Virgin Mary") and the Apostles' Creed ("born of the Virgin Mary"), and is a basic article of belief in the Catholic, Orthodox, and most Protestant churches. Muslims also accept the virgin birth of Jesus. Some may be confused the Virgin Conception with the doctrine of Immaculate Conception. Immaculate Conception is the doctrine which teaches that the Blessed Mary was conceived in the womb of her mother Ann, without the original sin. She

was free of original sin due to her special role to be the Mother of God's only Son.

The interweaving of the stories of the John's birth to Elizabeth and Zechariah provide an entry into the story of the birth of Jesus to Mary and Joseph. Luke is the only Evangelist that links the lives of John and Jesus in such an intimate way, identifying Elizabeth and Mary as relatives (1:36). Elizabeth gives birth to John in her old age; Mary gives birth to Jesus in her youth. Elizabeth gives birth to John six months before the birth of Jesus to Mary.

The angel Gabriel comes to Zechariah, a priest in the temple, to announce the news that their prayers have been answered and Elizabeth will bear a son who will be one like the prophet Elijah: "He will turn many of the people of Israel to the Lord their God" (1:16). Until the birth of John, Zechariah will be mute because of his unbelief in such an announcement (1:20). Because of her age and embarrassment about her pregnancy, Elizabeth remains in seclusion for five months (1:24-25).

Now, in the sixth month of Elizabeth's pregnancy, the angel Gabriel is sent by God "to a virgin engaged to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David. The virgin's name was Mary" (1:26-27). Mary receives Gabriel's words in wonderment: "Greetings, *favored one! The Lord is with you.*' But she was much perplexed by his words and pondered, what sort of greeting this might be" (1:28-29).
