CATECHETICAL CORNER SIN (Cont.)

Venial Sin: The word itself shows that it is something light opposite to mortal. It is the offense which does not kill the soul, yet which displeases God and often leads to moral sin. Examples of venial sin are the lighter violation of the Commandments. Instead of killing the soul, venial sin bruises the soul and it displeases the infinite holy God. But, at the same time, number of venial sins will never constitute a mortal sin. As they can lead us to commit mortal sins, we should take seriously our habit of committing the venial sins. In the confession, as far as possible we have to recall the venial sins and confess them too. Though we are in venial sins we can receive Holy Communion making an act of contrition, without going for Confession. That is the reason why the priest invites the congregation to make an act of contrition at the beginning of the Mass. But when we are in a mortal sin, we should abstain from receiving the Holy Communion till we make a good Confession. Also it is a good habit to make an Act of Contrition daily, before we go to bed.

As human beings it is hard for us to fight and win the battle against sins, both mortal and venial. But with the grace of God we can win over them. The regular Confessions and in the participation of the Holy Mass followed by the reception of the Holy Eucharist will add full of grace to our life.

THE VIRTUES

What is a Virtue: According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church, article 1804, a virtue is a habitual and firm disposition to do the good. It allows the person not only to perform good acts, but also to give the best of himself. The virtuous person tends toward the good with all his sensory and spiritual powers; he pursues the good and chooses it in concrete actions. In the Letter to Philippines 4:8 Paul instructs his community do virtuous acts. He says, "Whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is gracious, if there is any excellence, if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things." Only a virtuous person can think and do such acts described by Paul.

Virtue is a good habit, as opposed to a vice, which is a bad habit. Habit refers to the ease, readiness, satisfaction, and effectiveness with which we perform human actions. Habits reside in the faculties of the mind and the will. They may be acquired either by personal effort, or directly infused into the soul by God. Infused virtues are those supernatural virtues directly produced by God in the faculties of man.

Virtues are divided as: 1. Cardinal Virtues 2. Theological Virtues.

Cardinal Virtues: According to the Catechism four virtues play a pivotal role and accordingly are called *"Cardinal"* and all other virtues are grouped around them. **The Cardinal Virtues are: Prudence, Justice, Fortitude and Temperance.** These virtues are also known as Moral Virtues which praised under other names in may passages of Scripture.

Prudence: Correct knowledge about things to be done or, more broadly, the knowledge of things that ought to be done and of things that ought to be avoided. It is the intellectual virtue whereby a human being recognizes in any matter at hand what is good and what is evil. In this sense, it is the moral virtue that enables a person to devise, choose, and prepare suitable means for the attainment of any purpose or the avoidance of any evil. Prudence resides in the practical intellect and is both acquired by one's own acts and infused at the same time as sanctifying grace. It may be said to be natural as developed by us, and supernatural because conferred by God. As an act of virtue, prudence involves three stages of mental operation: to take counsel carefully with oneself and from others; to judge correctly on the basis of evidence at hand; and to direct the rest of one's activity according to the norms determined after a prudent judgment has been made.
