THE BIBLE STUDY

The Gospel of Luke

Luke 8: 40-56: In this long passage Luke puts two miracles together as they had a chronological order. In the episode of last week we heard the narration of the healing of the Gerasene demoniac. We saw the dramatic activities taking place. Finally Jesus managed to send the crowd away who was upset with him for sending the demons to the swine killing them all. He also sent away the healed man back home, instead of following him.

In this passage it is not clear the following miracles happened on the same day or not. Anyhow once again Jesus was with the crowd and there came Jairus the synagogue official with the earnest request to Jesus to heal his only daughter who was twelve.

As Jesus was getting ready to go with Jairus the woman appeared in the scene unnoticed who was also frustrated for years due to her hemorrhages. She has not bothered Jesus with a request or appeal; rather she believed strongly that it would be enough to touch the tassel on Jesus cloak to get healed. Indeed, she was right and she felt the healing in her. As she was relieved and about to leave the area Jesus caught her red-handed. Though nobody else noticed the woman Jesus never missed her. We see Jesus appreciating her faith which was deep. Jesus says to her, "Daughter your faith has saved you; go in peace."

No doubt, the only one who was upset was Jairus as Jesus was taking time here to talk to the woman. Because he knew that each minute is critical for his daughter. Secondly there was no transportation to travel quickly other than walking. We don't know how far Jairus lived from the area where he met Jesus. Unfortunately the worst thing happened as expected. The information came to Jairus that his daughter was already dead. To the surprise of Jairus Jesus still continued his walk to the house of Jairus which perhaps, gave a bit hope to him.

As they reached home already the wailing women were present who were called by the family to weep over the death. In this situation if somebody said

that the child was not dead, but sleeping, the crowd would ridicule the man. The same thing happened here. But long story short, Jesus kicked all of them out of the room where the body of the girl was lying. With two words of command, "Child, arise," Jesus raised the girl. Jesus then directed the dumfounded Jairus that the girl should be given to eat something. We don't for how many hours she ate anything. These words clearly show how human and concerned Jesus was.

The Mission of the Twelve (Luke 9:1-9)

In the ancient days there was in effect only one way of spreading a message abroad and that was by word of mouth. Newspapers did not exist; books had to be hand-written, and ordinarily nobody could afford to buy a book of gospel. Radio and television had not even been dreamed of. That is why Jesus sent out the Twelve on this mission. He was under the limitations of time and space; his helpers had to be mouths to speak for him.

They were to travel light. That was simply because the man who travels light travels far and fast. The more a man is cluttered up with material things the more he is shackled to one place. God needs a settled ministry; but he also needs those who will abandon earthly things to adventure for him. If they were not received they were to shake off the dust from their feet when they left the town. When Rabbis entered Palestine after some journey in a gentile land, they shook off the last particle of heathen dust from their feet. A village or town which would not receive them was to be treated as a strict Jew would treat a heathen country. It had refused its opportunity and had condemned itself.

That this ministry was mightily effective is plain from Herod's reaction. Things were happening. Perhaps Elijah, the forerunner, had at last come. Perhaps even the great promised prophet had arrived (<u>Deuteronomy 18:15</u>). And there was a lingering fear in Herod's mind that John the Baptizer, whom he thought he had eliminated, had come back to haunt him.
