CATECHETICAL CORNER

Virtues (Cont.)

Love of God and Neighbor (Cont.): We have already seen in the previous lesson as how should be our love towards God Almighty. Ando also with equal emphasis Jesus commands: "Love your neighbor as yourselves." So it is clear that love of self is not overlooked in the virtue of Charity. It is the Will of God that we should love ourselves with a holy love, that is, for God's sake; with a just love, that is, within the limits of what is pleasing to God; and with a true love, that is, desiring only what is supernaturally good for us. But at the same time self-love can become selfish and disorderly whenever we prefer ourselves and the things of this world to God and His divine Will. Our selfish love will totally eliminate God and our neighbor and will only concentrate on 'we and us.' The remedy for disorderly self-love is a constant fight against pride, by practicing humble obedience, against sensuality, by abstinence from unlawful pleasures, and against greed, by detaching our desires from the thing of this world. When we come out of the hard shell of selfish love we will be able to see our neighbor.

By love of neighbor we mean that we share with others what we possess. The command to love our neighbor is actually the profoundest human need. It is a positive hunger of the spirit to exercise its freedom, by freely giving of ourselves, for the love of God, in order to benefit others, and in the process we imitate the perfect sharing among the divine Persons in the Holy Trinity. Christ told us that the love we have for one another would identify us as his disciples: "By this love you have for one another, everyone will know that you are my disciples" (Jn 13:35).

In Leviticus 19: 18 God commands, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." It is not the part of the First Commandment, rather it is a precept. But when Jesus repeated the First Commandment he added this precept to the Commandment and gave equal importance. But to the Jews the 'neighbor' was nobody else but their fellow Jews. For them any non-Jew was their enemy. In the parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10: 29-37) Jesus corrects the wrong concept of the Jews. In this parable implicitly Jesus means that the wounded man was a Jew and the person who helped him was a Samaritan who was considered by the Jews as their bitterest enemy. So Jesus means to say that one's neighbor is not the one who belongs to one's religion, caste, or clan but anyone who is in need of our help in that particular moment. He/she may be a fellow Christian, a non-Christian or even non-believer and white or black. But at that moment of dire need he/she is our neighbor and we should never deny the possible help needed for that person.

Sometimes people claim that they don't care or bother others, but they love God and themselves. And also in the modern world there are a lot people who belong to this group. With ignoring our neighbor we cannot love God even I claim that I love Him. But that love is not pleasing to God at all. Jesus has put the Commandment 'love of God and love of neighbor' on the same page and the one without the other is incomplete. St. John asks us in his letter, "If anyone says, "I love God," but hates his brother, he is a liar; for whoever does not love a brother whom he has seen cannot love God whom he has not see. This is the Commandment we have from him: whoever loves God must also love his brother" (Jn 4:20). Again John writes, "No one has ever seen God. Yet, if we love one another, God remains in us and his love is brought to perfection in us."

Many don't have any objection against the Commandment of Jesus that we should love our neighbor as ourselves. But many find it very hard to accept the command of Jesus, "Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you." We have two types of enemies: 1. The enemies of mankind. They are the threat to humanity itself. They are the terrorists, all sorts of evil doers, murderers, child abusers etc. 2. We have our personal enemies who may not be any big danger to the society or mankind, rather they are the ones who offend our feelings intentionally or unintentionally. It is hard for us to tolerate them.
