## CATECHETICAL CORNER

## Life after Death

**Death:** Those who don't have faith in God or eternal life, death is the end of everything. But those believe in God are anxious to know 'What happens after death?' So far we believe that the soul is immortal, it should continue to live beyond this world and away from our bodies. Then the question as what is to become of it? The soul will still be its conscious self, able to experience happiness or misery under the new conditions to which it has gone. What will be those conditions be? Those who have not yet died obviously have to rely on **Revelation** to answer these questions. God alone knows what confronts men after death, and He alone can tell us about it. This He has done and His Revelation is contained in the definite teaching of the Catholic Church.

In regard to death itself we should remember it is; a) <u>A punishment for sin.</u> God said to Adam and Eve: "You are free to eat from any of the tress of the garden except from the tree of knowledge of good and bad. The moment you eat from it you are surely doomed to die" (Gen 2:16b-17). After their sin, God solemnly pronounced the sentence: "By the sweat of your face shall you get bread to eat, until you return to the ground, from which you were taken; for you are dirt, and to dirt you shall return" (Gen 3:19). St. Paul comments on death in Romans 5:12, "Therefore, just as through one person sin entered the world, and through sin, death, and thus death came to all in as much as all sinned." Paul again says in Romans 6:23, "For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord."

**b)** Death is the moment on which our eternity depends: For after death there is no more time for repentance or merit. Every opportunity to gain eternal life is given to us on earth only. Those who fail to use the given chances will never get another chance beyond this world. Earthly life is the only platform where we can gain merits for our eternal life.

<u>The time and circumstances of death is uncertain</u>: Jesus says, "You also must be prepared, for at an hour you do not expect, the Son of Man will come" (Lk 12:40). These days t he medical science is pretty accurate in predicting many things based on the test reports. But no doctors have ever predicted the time of one's death.

**Particular Judgment:** According to the teaching of the Catholic Church, immediately after death the souls stand before the Tribunal of Christ to face the Particular Judgment. As soon as the souls separate from the bodies, their fate is decided by God. There is no formal definition of the Church on this point, but it is clear from the Union Decree of Pope Eugene IV in 1439, the profession of faith of Michael Palaeologus in 1274, the Bull Benedictus Deus of Pope Benedict XII in 1336 that a Particular Judgment takes place for the souls before the Lord.

There are no Scripture texts which clearly and directly teach that immediately after death the eternal destiny of each separated soul is decided by the just Judgment of God, but that truth is implied in many passages of the Scripture. The parable of the rich man and Lazarus is one: "When the poor man died, he was carried away by angels to the bosom of Abraham. The rich man also died and was buried, and from the netherworld where he was tormented..." (Lk 16: 22). To the penitent revolutionary on the cross, Jesus says, "Amen I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise" (Lk 23:43). The early Church certainly believed in the fact of the Particular Judgment. It is clearly and emphatically stated by St. Augustine: "Souls are judged when they depart from the body, before they come to the Final Judgment which must be passed on them when reunited to the body, and are tormented or glorified in that same flesh which they were inhabited" (De Anima et ejus Origine). In support of this view Augustine quotes the parable of the rich man and Lazarus.
