CATECHETICAL CORNER

THE MASS

For us, the Catholics, no body need to instruct us on the importance of the Eucharist and Eucharistic Celebration. Once the Eucharist and the Eucharistic Celebration (The Mass) are taken away from the Church, nothing much is left in the Catholic Church. Catholic Church is the only denomination which holds the daily Mass and the preservation of the Eucharist for the sick and the shut-ins. So it is better we to understand the Mass and its prayers and rubrics fully so that we may be able to participate in the Mass fully. Long ago I have explained the meaning of the Mass, it is better that we refresh our learning. So this week on I am repeating the structure of the Mass step by step. In order to begin our study we need to start with the origin or the History of Mass. No doubt, the celebration of the Mass started in the first century itself, exactly speaking during the time of the Apostles. This is the only Celebration which goes back to the life time of the Apostles. If we take any other Celebrations like, Christmas and Easter, we know that they began in the 4th century, long after the death of the Apostles.

History: In the Catholic Church very often you hear the terms, **Eucharist, Eucharistic Celebration, Liturgy of the Eucharist, Holy Sacrifice, Holy Mass and Holy Communion.** Very often our Protestant brethren get a little confused over the meaning of all these terms. If we go back to the history of the early Church we hear the terms, **Breaking of the Bread, the Lord's Supper, Sacrament of the Altar and the Memorial of Christ's Passion, Death and Resurrection.** We Catholics know that all these terms are centered on one great mystery 'The Eucharist and its celebration. Preferably, the best term for the Mass is **Holy Sacrifice or Eucharistic Celebration**. But popularly it is known as <u>The Mass</u> where the Eucharist is the center of it. All Catholics know what the Eucharist is. The literal meaning of the word Eucharist is **thanksgiving** which comes from the Greek word <u>Eucharistia.</u> Eucharistia is given for the very fact that at the last Supper Jesus took the bread and cup of wine in hands and **thanked and praised the Heavenly Father** and then blessed them and gave to his disciples saying, **"This is my Body and this is my Blood**." According to the synoptic gospels, (the gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke) Jesus instituted the Eucharist at the Last Supper or the last Passover meal he celebrated with his disciples. And according to Luke's gospel Jesus commanded the disciples **"Do it memory of me."** So the disciples continued the celebration after the death and resurrection of Jesus.

Thanks to the detailed account of John on the Eucharistic discourse of Jesus (John 6: 25-35, 48-58), we Catholics are well aware of the importance of the Body and Blood of Jesus in our spiritual journey. As I explained you the Sacrament of the Eucharist, I have gone through the Eucharistic discourse of Jesus in great details and I am not repeating the same in this episode.

If we go through the early history of the Church we know that long before the celebrations of Christmas and Easter in the Church, the only celebration the Apostles and the early Christian communities had was the Eucharistic celebration. But at that time they have never called it Eucharistic celebration rather it is known as the "**Breaking of Bread**' described in the Acts of the Apostles chapter 2: 42 which says, "**They devoted themselves to the teaching of the apostles and to the communal life, to the breaking of the bread and to the prayers.**" As the early Christians were mostly Jewish converts they found the fulfillment of the Old Testament prophecies and covenant in the person and mission of Jesus. So the Christian Eucharistic celebration had deep roots in the Hebrew Passover, the ritual meal commemorating the original Passover in Egypt. Christian communities believed that within the setting of a Jewish Passover meal, the Lord instituted the Eucharistic Sacrificial meal of the New Covenant.
