CATECHETICAL CORNER

Eternal Punishment (Hell) Cont.

The word 'Hell' is derived from the Anglo-Saxon 'helan' *meaning 'to hide*. 'The meaning does not show any connection to the reality of Hell. Many early writings show that the idea of 'Hell' came into existence in the Church even in the second century itself. The Catholic Faith is stated in the ancient Athanasian Creed: *"They that have done what is good shall go into life everlasting, and they that have done evil into everlasting fire."* A Synod was held at Constantinople in 543 and its decrees, confirmed by Pope Vigilius, condemned all those who deny the eternity of Hell. Ten years later, this condemnation was renewed by the 5th General Council held at Constantinople. **St. Justin, who lived in the first half of the second century, went so far as to teach that if Hell does not exist, 'either there is no God, or if there is, He does not concern Himself with men, and virtue and vice have no meaning."**

There will always be many things about Hell which the human mind cannot fully understand. The judgments of God are inscrutable, His ways undiscoverable. Yet we can at least understand that all is one in God. He is Justice and He is Mercy. The two attributes cannot be at variance with one another. Each finds its infinite perfection in Him. God, because He is Goodness Itself, rewards the good and punishes the evil. St. Thomas Aquinas therefore says *"Hell glorifies the justice and goodness of God. He made men free to love Him; He does everything possible to win their love; throughout life He pursues them with His graces; and He only condemns them when they knowingly and willfully turn against Him and die as His enemies. Can we honestly blame Him for that? To maintain that He is always bound to forgive His creatures, no matter how wickedly they turn against Him. As it is, those who go to Hell only do so because they choose to go there. They put themselves in Hell. They have never asked for mercy, and they never will. They are fixed in evil forever."*

We are all curious to know where Hell exists. Unfortunately Jesus has not revealed anything to us and the Church Fathers too are silent about the '*where*' of *Hell*. St. John Chrysostom says, "We must not ask where Hell is; but how we to avoid it.

Eternal Life (Heaven)

<u>**Catholic Teaching</u>**: Like the word 'Hell', 'Heaven' is of Anglo-Saxon derivation, meaning 'th<u>e abode of the</u> <u>Godhead.</u>' In Scripture it is used in many senses; to denote the region of the clouds and of the stars, the dwelling of God, the abode of the Angels and the souls of the just. Thus Heaven has come to signify both the happiness and the abode of the just in the next life. It is of Catholic Faith, defined by Pope Benedict XII in 1336 that the souls of the just who die without any stain of sin or debt of punishment due to sin, see God immediately face to face. In the Old Testament this truth is gradually and progressively unfolded, but in the New Testament it is explicitly and clearly taught in very many places by Jesus himself.</u>

<u>Heaven in Scripture</u>: In the first three Gospels, called the Synoptic Gospels, our Lord speaks of a future eternal kingdom which the just shall possess and in which they shall see God. For instance, in the Sermon on the Mount, he says, "Blessed are the poor in spirit: for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are the clean of heart: for they shall see God. Blessed are they who are persecuted for the sake of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven." (Matt 5:3-12).

St. Paul is equally explicit: "For we know that if our earthly dwelling, a tent, should be destroyed, we have a building from God, a dwelling not made with hands, eternal in heaven. For in this tent we groan, longing to be further clothed with our heavenly habitation..." (2Cor 5:1-2).

In the Book of Revelation' St. John dedicates two chapters to the description of Heaven. "*Night will be no more; nor will they need light from lamp or sun, for the Lord God shall give them light, and they shall reign forever and ever*" (*Rev 22:5*). In the very beginning of John's gospel Jesus speaks very clearly about the eternal life which is Heavenly life. Please refer John 3:16-19.
