

### CATECHETICAL CORNER <u>Eternal Life (Heaven) (Cont.)</u>

**Heaven in Tradition:** When we turn to the constant Tradition of the Church, we find that the Fathers of the Church agree that the direct sight of God in Heaven is the reward awaiting those who die in God's favor. Indeed, there is little need to go beyond St. Ignatius of Antioch. In his letter to the Romans, he describes how his body has become irksome to him, for it hinders him from giving himself entirely to his Savior. He says, *"To die is to sink from the sight of this world and to rise again in God, to attain Christ, to be reborn to life, to enter into pure light."* Although some of the earlier writers seem to have thought that the direct sight of God would not be the lot of the just until after the General Resurrection, it is clear that the majority believed then just what the whole Church believes today. St. Augustine speaks for all when he says that Heaven consists before all else in the vision of God and in the full possession of the Truth, of Perfect Truth, known no longer in a concept or image, but in itself, through a direct and immediate vision.

It is the curiosity of everyone to know where the existence of Heaven is. Unfortunately, we don't have any clear information from any source at all. Jesus speaks a lot about Heaven and eternal life, but has not revealed to us the location of it. The Church has decreed nothing on this subject.

**The Happiness of Heaven:** People have all sorts of popular beliefs about the happiness in Heaven. Some consider it as the same material happiness we have on earth in its highest degree. If we compare the heavenly joy with the material happiness, we will be wrong. What we have seen and experienced in all our life is the earthly happiness and we cannot comprehend or imagine something different. Essentially the happiness of Heaven consists in seeing God immediately and directly, clearly and distinctly, face to face, as He is in Himself. This is known as the Beatific Vision. It far transcends all the powers of the created natures of men or Angels. We have already seen how, even during this life, the soul that is free from mortal sin possesses the seed of the vision of God, Sanctifying Grace, a new nature, elevating it to the divine order. Still, it is clear from Scripture that our sharing in the divine nature, our adopted sonship of God, cannot attain full perfection until our glorification after death.

The primary object of the Beatific Vision is God Himself, as He is. By direct intuition the Blessed see the essence of God and therefore all His perfections and all three Persons of the Blessed Trinity. Created ideas and images will give way to this Great Reality, which contains the knowledge of all else within it.

The secondary object of the Beatific Vision includes everything the Blessed have a reasonable interest in knowing. Thus those in Heaven understand all the mysteries they believed on earth; they see each other and rejoice in the company of dear ones separated from them by death. They know, too, the honor paid to them by those still on earth.

It is rather impossible for us to understand the changelessness of the happiness in Heaven. It is a final state which will be unaltered for eternity. During life on earth we associate happiness with change, going from one event to the other. But our happiness in Heaven will be perfect, though it won' jump from one action to another.

**<u>Purgatory</u>:** Among all other Christian Denominations, only Catholic Church believes and teaches about the existence of Purgatory. **Purgatory is believed to be a place where souls suffer for a temporary period for their venial sins before they attain eternal life.** It is logical to believe that no one can enter Heaven with the stain of sin in the soul. The soul which loves God perfectly till the moment of death goes straight to Heaven. The soul which does not love Him at all goes to straight to Hell. Both Heaven and Hell will endure for all eternity. But it is obvious that between these two states, perfect love and no love at all, there can be many intermediate conditions. Love can exist with a certain admixture of self under one form or another. So Purgatory is a place or condition of temporal punishment for those who, departing this life in God's grace, are not entirely free from venial sins, or have not fully paid the satisfaction due to their transgression.
