

CATECHETICAL CORNER <u>Purgatory (Cont.)</u>

<u>Purgatory - A Catholic Teaching</u>: Several Councils of the Church defined the doctrine of Purgatory, e.g. The Second Council of Lyons, 1274, and Florence, 1439, and their teaching is summarized in this clear statement of the Council of Trent: "Whereas the Catholic Church, instructed by the Holy Ghost, has from the Sacred Scriptures and the ancient tradition of the Fathers taught in Councils and very recently in this General Council that <u>there is a</u> <u>Purgatory</u>, and that the souls therein detained are helped by the suffrages (Intercessory prayers) of the Faithful, but principally by the acceptable Sacrifice of the Altar (Holy Mass</u>)."

We find two great truths in this statement: the first, that Purgatory exists; secondly, the souls detained there can be helped by our prayers, especially offering the Holy Mass and participating at the Holy Mass.

The definition of Purgatory given above refers to **satisfaction and venial sin**. The whole penitential system of the Church is clear evidence of the traditional belief in the necessary of self-denial to atone for sins forgiven and also evidence for the conviction that, unless atonement is made during this life, it will have to be made after death. When the tradition of the Church is examined, it is found that all the earliest writers in both East and West mention the custom of praying for the dead. Tertullian, at the beginning of the third century, alludes anniversary Masses in two different passages. *He says, "We make oblations for the dead, as for their birthdays." He continues in another passage, "The faithful widow prays for her husband's soul, and begs for him in the interim repose, and participation in the first resurrection, and she makes offerings for him on the anniversary of his death."*

St. Cyprian, St. Clement of Alexandria and Origen are all perfectly clear in this matter and they believed that the departed Faithful were in a condition in which they could be helped by their brethren still on earth. In fact, the practice of praying for the dead soon passed into the official liturgy of the Church, and it is as clear in the fourth century as it is today in our time.

In one of the famous passages in his *Confessions*, St. Augustine writes this of his mother, St. Monica: "Lay this body anywhere, she says; let not the care of it in any way disturb you. Only this I ask of you that you remember me at the altar of the Lord wherever you are."

Purgatory in Scripture: There are many instances in the Old Testament of God forgiving sins, yet demanding that reparation be made by those who have offended Him. Thus, although God forgave our first Parents their sin of disobedience, God still punished them with a little bit suffering. God said to Adam and Eve, "By the sweat of your face shall you get bread to eat, until you return to the ground, from which you were taken; for you are dirt and to dirt you shall return (Gen 3:19). Again when Moses and Aaron doubted God's Promise, God forgave their sins, but He kept them away from the Promised Land as punishment (Num. 20:12). It is said in 2 Maccabees 12:43-46, that Judas Maccabeus, the Commander of the Israelites' force made a collection among his soldiers for those have fallen dead and he collected two thousand silver drachamas. He then sent them to Jerusalem Temple for an expiatory sacrifice for the dead. In verse 46 we read, "*Thus he made atonement for the dead that they might be freed from this sin.*"

It is obvious that the prayers of the living can help the dead implies belief in a place of temporary punishment after death. The damned are beyond help; the Blessed do not need it. So when the great Judas sends an offering that prayers might be said for the dead, he may definitely be said to have believed in Purgatory. Paul in 1Corinthians 3: 10-15 speaks about building up of our life on the foundation who is Jesus Christ. He says: "If anyone builds on this foundation with gold, silver, precious stones, wood, hay, or straw, the work of each will come to light, for the Day will disclose it. It will be revealed with fire, and the fire (itself) will test the quality of each one's work. If the work stands that someone built upon the foundation, that person will receive a wage. But if someone's work is burned up, that one will suffer loss; *the person will be saved, but only through fire.* The traditional interpretation of these words sees in them a reference to Purgatory, but it is not quite so obvious as one might be led to believe. The Apostle says that the failure in the work will not be rewarded with eternal punishment rather the failed ones will also be saved through fire, means through purification. The fire does not mean that it is literally the material fire what we see in our earthly life. **(Will be continued).**
