CATECHETICAL CORNER

The Ten Commandments

<u>Introduction:</u> The Ten commandments, also known as the <u>Decalogue</u>, are a set of <u>Biblical</u> principles relating to <u>ethics</u> and <u>worship</u>, which play a fundamental role in <u>Judaism</u> and <u>Christianity</u>. They include instructions, to worship only <u>God</u> and to keep the <u>Sabbath</u>, and prohibitions against <u>idolatry</u>, <u>blasphemy</u>, <u>murder</u>, <u>theft</u>, <u>dishonesty</u>, and <u>adultery</u>. Different groups follow slightly different traditions for interpreting and numbering them.

The Ten Commandments appear twice in the <u>Hebrew Bible</u>, in the books of <u>Exodus</u> and <u>Deuteronomy</u>. According to the story in Exodus, <u>God inscribed them</u> on two stone tablets, which he gave to <u>Moses</u> on <u>Mount Sinai</u>. Modern scholarship has found likely influences in <u>Hittite</u> and <u>Mesopotamian</u> laws and treaties, but is divided over exactly when the Ten Commandments were written and who wrote them.

Religious interpretations: The Ten Commandments concern matters of fundamental importance in both Judaism and Christianity: the greatest obligation (to worship only God), the greatest injury to a person (murder), the greatest injury to family bonds (adultery), the greatest injury to law (bearing false witness), the greatest inter-generational obligation (honor to parents), the greatest obligation to community (truthfulness), the greatest injury to moveable property (theft).

The Ten Commandments are written with room for varying interpretation, reflecting their role as a summary of fundamental principles. They are not as explicit or detailed as rules or many other biblical laws and commandments, because they provide guiding principles that apply universally, across changing circumstances. They do not specify punishments for their violation. Their precise import must be worked out in each separate situation.

The Bible indicates the special status of the Ten Commandments among all other Old Testament laws in several ways. They have a uniquely terse style. Of all the biblical laws and commandments, the Ten Commandments alone were "written with the finger of God" (Exodus 31:18). And lastly, the stone tablets were placed in the Ark of the Covenant.

<u>Christianity:</u> Christians believe the Ten Commandments have divine authority and continue to be valid, though they have different interpretations and uses of them. Through most of Christian history, the Decalogue has been considered a summary of God's law and standard of behavior, and has been central to Christian life, piety, and worship.

<u>References in the New Testament</u>: During his <u>Sermon on the Mount</u>, Jesus explicitly referenced the prohibitions against murder and adultery. In <u>Matthew 19:16-19 Jesus</u> repeated five of the Ten Commandments, followed by that commandment called "the second" (<u>Matthew 22:34-40</u>) after the <u>first and great commandment</u>.

<u>Catholicism:</u> In Roman Catholicism, Jesus freed Christians from <u>Jewish religious law</u>, but not from their obligation to keep the Ten Commandments. In other words, the Ten Commandments are binding under the New Law. Jesus himself confirmed the Ten Commandments when he said: "Do not think that I have come to abolish the law and the prophets. I have come not to abolish but to fulfill. Amen, I say to you, until heaven and earth pass away, not the smallest letter or the smallest part of a letter will pass from the law, until all things have taken place" (5:17-18). He brought the commandments to perfection in the Sermon on the Mount.

According to the <u>Catechism of the Catholic Church</u>—the official exposition of the <u>Catholic Church</u>'s Christian beliefs—the Commandments are considered essential for spiritual good health and growth, and serve as the basis for <u>social justice</u>. Church's teaching of the Commandments is largely based on the <u>Old</u> and <u>New Testaments</u> and the writings of the early <u>Church Fathers</u>. In the New Testament, Jesus <u>acknowledged their validity</u> and instructed his <u>disciples</u> to go further, demanding a righteousness exceeding that of the <u>scribes</u> and <u>Pharisees</u>. Summarized by Jesus into two "<u>great commandments</u>" that teach the love of God and love of neighbor, they instruct individuals on their relationships with both. Out of the Ten Commandments only three Commandments pertain to the love of God. They regulate our relation to God and express the fundamental obligations of religion. Amazingly enough, the rest of the Seven Commandments pertain to the love of neighbor. In other words, they regulate our relationship with our fellow beings and express the fundamental obligations of morality.
