CATECHETICAL CORNER Theological Virtues (Cont.)

CHARITY; LOVE OF GOD & NEIGHBOR

Charity is the supernatural virtue by which we love God above all things for His own sake and our neighbor as ourselves, as Christ has commanded us. Again, it is a supernatural gift from God and not acquired by our personal effort. It enables us to do what is naturally impossible to attain the eternal vision of God by loving him, our neighbor, and ourselves with the same love as He has been showing us. The main object of our Charity is God and the secondary objects are ourselves and our neighbors.

The love of God is the first Commandment and Jesus held the same as the most important Commandment. In Matthew 22:37 Jesus repeats the Commandment, "*You must love the lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind.*" This Commandment demands that we must love God above all other things, and be ready to lose everything rather than offend him. Charity toward God, expressed by frequent acts of love, is necessary for our salvation. In perfect charity, we are not motivated by any benefit, but simply by the desire to please the all-good God. A person can sin against charity toward God by failure to make acts of the love of God, by inordinate love of creatures, by ungrateful murmuring against God, by a dislike or hatred of God, and by every sin committed, especially mortal sin.

And also with equal emphasis Jesus commands: "Love your neighbor as yourself." So it is clear that love of self is not overlooked in this Virtue of Charity. It is the Will of God that we should love ourselves with a holy love, that is, for God's sake; with a just love, that is, within the limits of what is pleasing to God; and with a true love, that is, desiring only what is supernaturally good for us. But at the same time self-love can become selfish and disorderly whenever we prefer ourselves and the things of this world to God and his divine Will. Our selfish love will totally eliminate God and our neighbor and we will only concentrate on '*we and us*.' The remedy for disorderly self-love is a constant fight against pride, by practicing humble obedience, against sensuality, by abstinence from unlawful pleasures, and against greed, by detaching our desires from the thing of this world. When we come out the hard shell of selfish love we will be able to see our neighbor

Love of Neighbor: By love of neighbor we mean that we share with others what we possess. The command to love our neighbor is actually the profoundest human need. It is a positive hunger of the spirit to exercise its freedom, by freely giving of ourselves, for the love of God, in order to benefit others, and in the process we imitate the perfect sharing among the divine Persons in the Holy Trinity. Christ told us that the love we have for one another would identify us as his disciples: "By this love you have for one another, everyone will know that you are my disciples" (Jn 13:35).

In Leviticus 19:18 God commands, "*You shall love your neighbor as yourself.*" It is not the part of the First Commandment rather it is a precept. But when Jesus repeated the First Commandment he added this precept to the Commandment and gave equal importance. But to the Jews the 'neighbor' was nobody else but their fellow Jew. For them any non-Jew was their enemy. In the parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:29-37) Jesus corrects the wrong concept of the Jews. In this parable implicitly Jesus means that the wounded man was a Jew and the person who helped him was a Samaritan who was considered by the Jews as their bitterest enemy. So Jesus means to say that one's neighbor is not the one who belongs to one's religion, caste, or clan but anyone who is in need of our help in that particular moment. He/she may be a fellow Christian, a non-believer and white or black. But at that moment of dire need he/she is our neighbor and we should never deny the possible help needed for that person.

Sometimes people claim that they don't care or bother others, but they love God and themselves. And also in the modern world there a lot of people who belong to this group. With ignoring our neighbor we cannot love God and even if we love Him that love is not pleasing to God at all. Jesus has put the Commandment 'love of God and love of neighbor' on the same page and the one without the other is incomplete. St. John asks us in his letter, "If anyone says, "I love God," but hates his brother, he is a liar; for whoever does not love a brother whom he has seen cannot love God whom he has not seen. This is the Commandment we have from him: whoever loves God must also love his brother" (Jn 4:20). Again, John writes in 4:12, "No one has ever seen God. Yet, if we love one another, God remains in us, and his love is brought to perfection in us."
