### **CATECHETICAL CORNER**

### Prayer (Cont.)

Last we discussed the three types of prayer, such as, **Vocal Prayer, Mental Prayer and Meditation.** And also we went through the subject matter of prayer. This week too we continue with the Prayer.

**ATTITUDES OF PRAYER:** When we approach God in prayer the first attitude we need is **humility.** We should not be like the Pharisee who went on boasting over the good things he was doing and never acknowledged that he was an unworthy sinner. Whereas the tax collector was so humble and he didn't dare to raise his eyes towards God and he acknowledged his sinfulness (Luke 18: 9-14). Let us remember it is not our right to get from God what we are asking for. Rather it is His graciousness to answer our prayers. So at the end of every prayer we need to conclude, "Provided it is your Will." Our attitude to God should be that of a child to his/her parents. The child is free to ask anything from the parents which he thinks good. But good parents will never give him all things he is asking for, but only the good things needed for him. This is exactly what God too does when we pray. He knows what is needed for us and will grant what is good for us according to his view.

Secondly we should go to pray with **care and attention**. In other words we need to keep our attention focused on what we pray avoiding maximum the distractions. But at the same time the difficulty of concentration is the regular complaints always the priests hear in the confessions. As we live in the world of distractions, our mind is filled with a lot of things in the world. So even when we go in for prayer we take the whole world with us. Very often if we go for mental prayer the distractions may be more in the silence of our mind. Sometimes structured prayer can help to keep our mind concentrated. Other times our personal spontaneous prayer too may help us to avoid distractions. Another area of distraction is when we pray the routine prayers like rosary or the participation in the liturgical celebration. Very often our attention is not needed much to respond for the prayers.

We know that when we stay before the Lord to pray we need to keep our concentration or focus to what we pray. Naturally, if the need is genuine and intense, our minds cannot wander away from the subject and God. In such situations people may not be bothered about what is going on around them at all. We read incidents in the lives of saints how involved they were in their personal prayers. It is said that when John Maria Vianney was praying at times he would be lifted above the ground, especially when his prayer became intense. St. Ignatius Loyola prayed for days remaining in a room alone before he took a decision on his future course of life. It is said that at the end of the long period of prayer one of walls in the room cracked from one corner to another, showing the intensity of his prayer. The prayer of Jesus was so intense in the Garden of Gethsemane and Luke says: "He was in such agony and he prayed so fervently that his sweat became like drops of blood falling on the ground (Lk 22:44). The above are the few examples of intense prayer and deep concentration in prayer.

Unfortunately, we don't have such experience in prayer. But we too pray on different occasions. Sometimes, when we are overwhelmed with sadness or frustrations we fail to concentrate on prayer. In such situations for some people the minds wander away in the areas of their sadness. Some others cannot even say a prayer and simply sit in the Church or Chapel. Very often people come out utterly disappointed that they could not pray at all. This type of situations can happen to all of us. So when you are overwhelmed with grief, sadness, frustration and anger, instead of struggling to form prayers, it is better simply sit before the Lord and pour out your feelings before the Lord and this is also a good prayer. The prayer of Jesus in the Garden is example of the outpouring of his feelings to His Father. As beginners, it is always advisable to use a prayer book. In the prayer book you get all sorts of prayers for different needs and occasions. In normal situation a prayer book is helpful, especially for our morning offering and night prayer, where we can sit sometime quietly. But then what about during our busy work schedule? Can we pray at that time? If we want we can make the whole day a prayer day while we work or study. During our work, for example, we don't have to sit in one place for prayer, rather at times we can raise our thoughts to God and offer that particular hour to God with our work. It takes only a few moments to do so. **(We will continue next week).**
