CATECHETICAL CORNER

Devotion to Mary (Cont.)

MARY MOTHER OF GOD

On January 1st we celebrate the Feast, "Mary Mother of God." This doctrine raises a lot of doubts even in the minds of Catholics too. Many raise the question, "How can Mary be the Mother of God?" For the first time, the objection to the title "Mother of God" arose in the fifth century, due to confusion concerning the Mystery of the Incarnation. Nestorius, Bishop of Constantinople (428-431), incited a major controversy. He stated that Mary gave birth to Jesus Christ, a regular human person, period. To this human person was united the person of the Word of God (the divine Jesus). This union of two persons--the human Christ and the divine Word-- was "sublime and unique" but merely accidental. The divine person dwelt in the human person "as in a temple." Following his own reasoning, Nestorius asserted that the human Jesus died on the cross, not the divine Jesus. As such, Mary is not "Mother of God," but simply "Mother of Christ"--the human Jesus. Thus Nestorius divided Jesus into two persons; divine and human against the doctrine of the Church, Jesus – one person and two natures, divine and human.

The controversy became confusing to the faithful. So on June 22, AD 431, the Council of Ephesus convened to settle this argument of Nestorius. The Council declared, "If anyone does not confess that the Emmanuel is truly God and therefore that the holy Virgin is the Mother of God (*Theotokos*) (since she begot according to the flesh the Word of God made flesh), anathema sit." Therefore, the Council officially recognized that Jesus is one person, with two natures--human and divine--united in a true union. Secondly, the Council affirmed that our Blessed Mother can rightfully be called the Mother of God. Mary is not Mother of God, the Father, or Mother of God, the Holy Spirit; rather, she is Mother of God, the Son--Jesus Christ. For we believe that Jesus Christ, the Second Person of God is truly God. In that case, Mary can be called the Mother of God.

GRACE

<u>What is Grace?</u> — In both popular language and Ecclesiastical language we hear the word Grace being used in different senses. We are familiar with the saying, 'Let us begin the meal with saying the grace.' Sometimes people speak about the elegant and beautiful appearance of person using the phrase, 'graceful look.' Very often we invite people with the request, 'to grace the occasion with your valuable presence.' Sometimes the students are given extra time to pay their student loan, known as 'grace period.' These are some of the common/popular uses of the word 'grace.'

In Ecclesiastical language the word 'Grace' has got divine and deeper meaning. In the definition of the <u>Catechism of the Catholic Church</u>, "grace is favor, the free and undeserved help that God gives us to respond to his call to become children of God, adoptive sons, partakers of the divine nature and of eternal life." Divine grace is a <u>theological</u> term present in many <u>religions</u>. It has been defined as the <u>divine</u> influence which operates in humans to regenerate and sanctify, to inspire virtuous impulses, and to impart strength to endure trial and resist temptation; and as an individual virtue or excellence of divine origin.

Grace is a supernatural gift that, through the merits of Jesus Christ, God freely bestows on human beings in order to bring them to eternal life. Nature is what we are born with and into, when we enter this world; grace is what we still need to enter heaven in the world to come. Grace is a participation in the life of God, which is poured unearned into human beings, whom it heals of sin and sanctifies. The means by which God grants his grace are many. They include the entirety of revealed truth, the <u>Sacraments</u> and the hierarchical ministry. Among the principal <u>means of grace</u>, are the Sacraments (especially the <u>Eucharist</u>), prayers and good works. The <u>Sacramental</u> also is means of grace. The Sacraments themselves, no matter how unworthy is the person who administers it, are "the means of grace", although lack of the required dispositions on the part of the recipient will block the effectiveness of the Sacrament in him/her.

The Catholic Church holds that "by grace alone, in faith in Christ's saving work and not because of any <u>merit</u> on our part, we are accepted by God and receive the Holy Spirit, who renews our hearts while equipping and calling us to good works. The <u>Council of Trent</u> declared that "none of those things which precede justification — whether faith or works — merit the grace itself of justification. (*Justification is the passing from a state of sin to the state of grace and adoption as children of God. "Now you have washed clean," says St. Paul, "and sanctified, and justified through the name of the Lord Jesus Christ and through the Spirit of our God" (1Cor:11). (We will continue next week).*
