CATECHETICAL CORNER

Sacramental

Sign of the Cross (cont.): Last week we started with the Sacramental of the Sign of the Cross. Let us continue with same and other Sacramental. The Sign of the Cross dates from apostolic times. In the second century, Tertullian wrote of it as follows: "In all our travels and movements, in all our comings in and going out, in putting on our shoes, at the bath, at the table, in lighting our candles, in lying down, in sitting, whatever employment occupies us, we mark our foreheads with the Sign of the Cross." Today the Sing of the Cross is used continuously in our worship – over 50 times in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, 14 times in administering Baptism, regularly in the Divine Office, and as a symbol of blessing. The picture of the Cross appears in many objects we use for Divine Worship such as the altars, altar linen, corporal and purificators, books etc. Above all on the Church Structure of a Catholic Church we see the Cross. Many of us begin the day with the Sign of the Cross and conclude the day with the same. The saints have called the Sign of the Cross a reminder of the price of our redemption, for Christ redeemed us on the Cross.

Holy Water: Like the Sign of the Cross, the Catholics are very familiar with the Holy Water. When they enter the Church any time, first they go to the Holy Water bowl and dip the finger and make a Sign of the Cross. The Holy Water is ordinary water till the priest blesses it in the name of the Church. In the Old Catholic custom the Holy Water to be sprinkled over the people before each Sunday Mass. In the modern time, only during the Easter Season of 8 weeks the Holy Water is sprinkled before Sunday Mass. The Catholics also are allowed to take the Holy Water home from the tank kept in the church, provided it will be preserved in a place of respect and used for good purpose. Also the use of the Holy Water reminds us of our own Baptism in which we are baptized. The priest uses the Holy Water on different occasions such as, in the blessing of the religious articles, at the funeral, at the committal service in the cemetery and he can use it even when he blesses the people or individuals. The devout use of Holy Water undoubtedly brings us many blessings from God. It is especially powerful as a safeguard against temptation and a relief of the poor souls in purgatory when it is sprinkled on the ground when the priest prays for the souls. The great St. Teresa of Avila tells us the following, "I have often found by experience that there is nothing from which the devils fly more quickly and return not again than from Holy Water."

Genuflection: This sign is also strictly Catholic. After taking Holy Water from the font near the door of the Church, Catholics choose their place, but before entering the pew, they normally genuflect toward the altar. In case of knee problem or other health concerns, better not to venture to genuflect, rather give a deep bow toward the altar and get into the pew. It is a sign of profound reverence and adoration to the Holy Eucharist present in the Tabernacle, normally placed behind the altar. During the personal prayer, it is a good practice that we keep kneeling (if possible) and also at particular time we keep kneeling down during the Mass. This custom goes back to the very earliest stage of Christianity. The early Church inherited this practice from Jesus himself. We read in the gospel of Luke 22: 41, "And he (Jesus) was withdrawn away from them a stone's cast; and kneeling down, he prayed." In the Acts of the Apostles we see the apostles kneeling down and praying. Genuflecting, like all the other outward acts of religion, is a Sacramental with the power to help sanctify us and bring us nearer to God.

<u>Statues:</u> One of the features of the most Catholic churches is the presence of statues or images of Our Lord, his holy Mother and the Saints. Often Catholics are criticized by the Protestants for the presence of these statues in the churches and mistakenly they believe that Catholics are idol worshipers. Of course, Catholics are not foolish so as to worship and pray to images or statues. Their real attitude is explained in the following quotation from the official decrees of the Council of Trent which says: "The images of Christ and the Virgin Mother of God and of the other Saints, are to be kept, especially in churches, and due honor and veneration are to be given them; not that any divinity or virtue is believed to be in them, on account of which they are to be worshiped, or that anything is to be asked of them, or that trust is to be reposed in images, as was done of old by Gentiles, who placed their hope in idols."
